The Domestic Violence Intervention Centre Vienna

- ... is a victim support institution officially recognised by the State, offering pro-active supportive counselling for victims of domestic violence (mainly women and children) and coordination of measures to prevent violence.
- Austrian Federal Act on Protection against Domestic Violence (1997)
- **6.185 clients** in 2017: most of them referred to the Intervention Centre by the police in the context of the emergency barring order

Anti-Violence Programme Vienna (since 1999) – *An Overview*

- Carried out in **partnership** between Intervention Centre Vienna and Men's Centre Vienna
- Based on international standards
- Victim protection is at the centre
- Objectives: changing men's violent behaviour with the aim of taking responsibility and stopping all forms of violence; offering protection and empowering support to the victim and the children; promoting gender equality and partnership between women and men
- Referrals: criminal court/public prosecutor, family court, youth welfare service, self-referral
- No secure funding for perpetrator training

Anti-Violence Programme Vienna - *Structure*

PERPETRATOR TRAINING

(Men's Centre Vienna)

- Referral and first contact
- Clearing phase: 1) diagnostic assessment; 2) Clearing group (assessment phase)
- Training groups (min. 32 sessions)
- Support in crisis situations (risk of repeat violence)

VICTIM(S) SUPPORT

(Intervention Centre Vienna)

- Contacting the (ex)partner and building a relationship of trust
- Information; assessing situation
- Ongoing danger assessment + safety planning
- Holistic support before, during and after the training, including crisis intervention in event of renewed violence

JOINT MANAGMENT + COOPERATION

- Weekly exchange of information after training sessions
- Monthly meetings to discuss progress and setbacks
- Joint risk assessment
- Crisis intervention measures to prevent re-offending
- Joint management meetings on the running of the programme

Anti-Violence Programme Vienna – *Statistics 2017*

■ **157 participants** in the programme in 2017

- ► 79 did not attend the programme after the clearing phase (mostly lack of motivation)
- ► 20 dropped out during the programme
- 29 completed the programme in 2017
- ▶ 29 were still attending the programme at the end of 2017

Conclusion:

- -> only about 2-3% of our perpetrators contacted the programme
- -> only 0,5% completed it
- -> main reasons: lack of motivation to participate voluntarily, lack of referrals by the justice system

National Working Group on Victim-Safety Oriented Work with Perpetrators (since 2012) – *An Overview*

- Network of expert organizations: Intervention Centres, Women's Shelters, Men's Counselling Centres, Probation Service (currently 22 members)
- 2 annual meetings; sub-group meetings
- **Objectives:** development and enhancement of victim-safety oriented work with perpetrators in Austria; establishment and implementation of standards in line with the Istanbul Convention (art. 16)
- Networking + information exchange with relevant authorities (justice system, youth welfare service...)
- Funded by ministries (small grant of € 7.000)

National Working Group on Victim-Safety Oriented Work with Perpetrators – *Achievements*

- Mapping on perpetrator services + programmes in Austria
- Standards and Guidelines; Information folder
- Cooperation agreement between national probation service and victim support services
- Current work on: standardization of data collection; lack of referrals to perpetrator programmes; differing concepts of victim-safety oriented WWP among members
- Involvement at European level (WWP EN)

Challenges

- Lack of court/authority referrals to prepetrator programmes (lack of accountability for perpetrators in the criminal justice system; impunity)
- Underreported violence against women
- Requirement of perpetrator`s consent to cooperation and information exchange
- No working programmes in many provinces
- **Tension:** differing concepts of victim-safety oriented WWP
- Lack of data
- Lack of funding (e.g. AVP only in German language)

Recommendations

- Effective measures to guarantee effective prosecution and punishment, incl. training for public prosecutors and judges
- Ensure court/authority referrals of perpetrators to programmes which fulfill the standards of the Istanbul Convention
- Cooperation and information exchange must not depend on the consent of the perpetrator
- Recommendations GREVIO Baseline Evaluation Report Austria: expansion of victim-safety oriented WWP; concerns for data protection of perpetrators should not supersede the rights of victims to protection from violence
- Ensure collection of minimum data according to art. 11 of the Istanbul Convention
- Ensure adequate and sustainable (long-term) **funding** for victim-safety oriented perpetrator programmes (in all 9 provinces)
- Increase understanding of the situation of victims
