

These movements are producing changes at individual and collective level related to access to resources, laws and polices, empowerment and social norms related to inequalities and discriminations of women globally. We also have a specific focus on three areas of work addressing violence against women (intra-familial violence, trafficking and exploitation and violence in situations of crisis) and 12 countries.


